
TOTAL HEALTH EXPENDITURE AND PERCENTAGE OF EXPENDITURE ON INPATIENT CARE

Total health expenditure represents the consumption of healthcare goods and services plus capital investments in healthcare infrastructure, given by the sum of public and private expenditure on health.

In 2011, the average value of **per capita total health expenditure** in the EU was 3.231 US\$, but it varied from 1.429 US\$ for 'EU13' to 3.717 US\$ for 'EU15'.

Between 2000 and 2011 health expenditure per capita increased significantly in all European Member States, in particular in Romania (+264%), Slovakia (+246%), Bulgaria (+176%) and Estonia (+158%).

The share of health expenditure devoted to **inpatient care** embraces current expenditure in inpatient institutions for acute, chronic and convalescent care, including public and private hospitals.

In 2011, per capita expenditure on inpatient care represented almost the 35% of overall healthcare spending, from 20% in Portugal to close to 47% in Italy and the Netherlands.
